Dear friend, a letter from an absormey has just arrived, containing the following words:

"At the present time it appears that the sum of \$300,000 is due on the payments of March 1, 1981, and June 1, 1981.

The Trustee Council has advised that these payments must be made on or before July 15, 1981, or I am to proceed and file a Notice of Default."

This letter comes to us on behalf of the fine Christian college from whom we purchased them 34 acres. They heed funds from this campus to pay for their new campus. We feel they are being entirely fair and reasonable. Indeed they have many times give out of their way to help as.

I confess to the fear, even as I write this (see west page)

#### A LOOK INSIDE

JUST A YEAR AGO we wondered if God would allow us to secure the "second half" of the campus. He did!

Now we confront the possibility of losing everything. However, after much prayer we believe that God has asked us to take a new, exciting step of faith.

This issue sketches both the absolutely unprecedented CRISIS and the absolutely unprecedented OPPORTUNITY we face. Remember Paul: "a wide door for effective service has opened to me and there

are many adversaries." In our case we do not face human adversaries, we can be glad.

But we must praise God for both the CRISIS and the OPPORTUNITY because in a curious way the crisis, as dire and real as it is, makes the opportunity both bigger and more accessible! God certainly works in mysterious and wondrous ways.

CAUTION: the dimensions of the Frontier Fellowship MOVEMENT are so staggering that you may find it far, far easier to understand our short-term CRISIS than the longer-term OPPORTUNITY.

We hope you will read, mark, and inwardly digest. This is a landmark issue. In March we spoke of a NEW STEP FORWARD. At that time we could not have aspired to foreclosure becoming our greatest ally in the new step we were already planning! Now, humanly speaking we do not cherish this test.

( Continued from front page) that you just might leap to the conclusion that we went have done something wrong or we would not face this crisis. On, you may feel this is one crisis too many! (HOWEVER) I have to stop and realize ( after days and weeks of agonizing prayer ) that this is the ford's project and it is now a mamonth project, not easily aborted. Yes, God has led on and helped us on a 48- month pathway filled with many of the miraclas. Consider the following boots: - We have almost 200 ball-time people here every day - despite 34 Jon staff "escaping" us to work creisear! REHILY: a coalition of evangelied organization can entire a million people in the Frontie Fellowship. If can be done. Will this be in your prayon? What is the value of this goal? It will mean 365 million times a year people will be stopping to pray for and read about the final frontiers. Also, it will generate \$100 million per year for frontiers. And, it will solve our problem at its ROOT.

Meanwhile, do pray that by July 15th enough people will believe that this can and must be done so that we can avoid freedome evan in the short run.

#### T.S.F.M

On May 6-7 in Dallas, TX, 17 students from 6 major U.S. seminaries met and formed a national body of theological students to promote the cause of frontier missions.

The purpose of "Theological Students for Frontier Missions" (TSFM) is to "mobilize graduate theological students to a lifetime commitment to the task of frontier missions for the glory of God." The group, growing out of a task force at the International Consultation on Frontier Missions at the Edinburgh meetings (see Mission Frontiers, Dec. 1980) adopted as their watchword, "A Church for Every People By the Year 2000."

was elected General Secretary;
Buck Butler (Westminster), fulltime Traveling Secretary; and
Jeffrey Fendley (Dallas),
Corresponding Secretary.

An 8-member Student Cabinet of participants from other major seminaries was appointed to oversee staff, implement goals

and standards, convene annual meetings, etc. E. Mike Jaffarian (Fuller) was elected President of the cabinet.

At a later time, five Senior advisors (mission leaders) will be chosen to provide spiritual guidance and direction to the TSFM staff and cabinet.

Recognizing the leading role seminarians will have in the Church and the fact that only 1 to 2 percent of seminarians serve in any kind of missions overseas—the eight TSFM objectives focus on fostering a new, vital, spiritual involvement in the cause of frontier missions by theological students and graduate theological institutions.

Membership in TSFM is open to any present or former student of a graduate theological seminary who consents to the purpose of TSFM.

#### FRONTIER FELLOWSHIP NEWS

\$100,000,000 GOAL SET FOR FRONTIER FELLOWSHIP MOVEMENT

In an effort to firmly establish and support a massive new missions effort focused particularly on specially defined "frontiers," the U.S. Center for World Mission is actively promoting the development of an evangelical movement called the "Loose Change Frontier Fellowship."

The campaign is centered around daily prayer for the Hidden Peoples, devotional reading, and "loose change" giving. The initial goal is to involve a million believers in the movement to raise \$100,000,000 annually for the frontiers of world mission.

Funds raised by the "Frontier Fellowship" would be channeled through churches and agencies, designated for reaching the "hidden" peoples of the world.

By setting aside loose coins each day, members of the "Frontier Fellowship" will raise an average of  $27\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per day, which totals about \$100 per year. Amillion such believers will raise \$100,000,000 in new money annually for new frontier outreach!

#### FRONTIER MISSION CONSORTIUM DEVELOPING

Several mission agencies and other Christian organizations are involved in serious promotion and development of a Frontier Mission Consortium.

The emerging Frontier Mission Consortium is made up of agencies and organizations to promote a nationwide evangelical daily prayer and giving "campaign" focused on the world's Hidden Peoples.

Some groups have already boldly stated their goals: The United Presbyterian Frontier Fellowship has set as a goal 100,000 people for their Frontier Fellowships. Lutheran Bible Institute in Seattle is seeking

1,000 to "join the cause," and North Africa Mission is working towards a goal of 2,000 Frontier Fellowship members. Other agencies and groups are also considering the plan.

Various Frontier Consortiums will be formed among mission agencies, Christian schools, denominations, organizations, etc. Funds raised must be designated exclusively for outreach to "hidden" cultural groups with no evangelizing church in their midst.

Any organization, school, denomination or agency willing to promote prayer and giving to reach the frontiers is being invited to join the consortium and help foster this united evangelical "march of dimes" for frontier missions.

#### LOCAL CHURCHES FORM FRONTIER FELLOWSHIPS

What do these churches have in common---Chapel Woods Presbyterian Church in Decatur, GA; Calvary Baptist Church in Gardena, CA; World Gospel Church in Columbia, SC; and True Light Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles, CA? They were among the very first churches in the United States to begin a Frontier Fellowship in their own congregations!

These Frontier Fellowships consist of individuals who daily empty their pockets or purses of their loose change, put the money into a jar labeled "Remember the Hidden Peoples," and use that disturbance to the daily routine as a gentle, friendly reminder to pray for the hidden peoples. They would then meet regularly (usually monthly) with others to pool their resources, fellowship and pray together. Their gathered funds are then designated by the group or church to a particular agency involved in frontier mission work.

It's a simple yet significant daily discipline. It has a powerful potential for raising millions of dollars for frontier missions, as well as developing vision for reaching the Hidden Peoples!



Instead of following the idea of "loose change," I have adapted it to fit my situation. I have determined to "match funds" monthly with that which I spend for coffee with the guys in the morning. Coffee is my daily luxury. . .

I have just finished reading the Jericho book. . . I feel at one with you all at the "Pasadena Campus" in your tremendous team-effort for the Hidden Peoples of the world.

I wish I could respond to all your challenges! I am 72, and involved in many things that fill up my days, but I will keep trying! . . .

We started the loose change plan in our home, and thank you for sending the jar labels and the good information. It is a good plan.

What I did do after reading . . . the Jericho book, was to get out my "Unreached Peoples '79," and "Unreached Peoples '81" and read Ralph Winter's tremendous articles in those 2 books again.

Then I did something today that I should have done long ago; I set aside a whole hour (60 minutes) to look through those amazing lists of Tribes and People Groups. I tried to make it a time of agonizing intercession for all those Hidden People. Only 2,914 unreached peoples in the lists given! What a vast number of people they are, and all unreached! I began to realize what 16,750 really means in terms of human souls who need urgent attention and our sacrificial efforts, to put it mildly.

I love Ralph Winter's idea of living a wartime lifestyle for the sake of World Evangelization. Pray for me that I may not disgrace the idea any more, I'm afraid I'm a typical affluent. But I do thank God with all my heart for the way World Literature Crusade taught me to be a "One-Hour Watcher." I'm going to use that prayer warfare training to pray daily for "the Pasadena Campus" and all those lists of Tribes, etc.

Onward and Forward, N.B. Ontario, Canada 12 Mission Frontiers/July 1981 Several years ago a missionary friend of mine gave me the book "Once More Around Jericho."

OTHER: NATIVE AMERICANS

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In the United States of America, there are about 900,000 Native Americans, about half of whom now live in cities. Many of the remainder continue to live on Reservations. These Indian peoples are divided into 150 tribes.\*

In the State of Washington, there are about 30,000 Native Americans. The largest tribe is the Yakima, with 3,000 members.\*\*


In the summer of 1980, the Institute of Native American Studies, under the leadership of Paul Herman, Research Associate, launched a search for Hidden People in the western part of the State of Washington. It was determined that 14 of the 21 Indian Reservations in this part of the state had no indigenous church. Furthermore, it was found that 8 of the 14 had no church at all.

The eight Reservations in western Washington which have no Christian church at all are as follows:

The people of these tribes deserve God's best--the Word of God, the Living Christ in their own language and culture.

BHUTAN



Bhutan is a small nation lying between India on the south and the Tibetan area of China on the north. In the eastern Himalayas, its mountains run generally from north to south, separated by deep valleys. It covers 19,305 square miles.

The Bhotia people of Bhutan are related to the Tibetans, and are Buddhists. They make up two-thirds of the 1,300,000 population; Hindus of Nepalese background make up about onefourth; and Muslims, the remaining small number.

Historically, the people from Nepal (which lies to the west) were hired for very low wages to do hard labor, such as road building. Originally, they were encouraged to enter Bhutan as migrant workers. Since 1959, all immigration has ceased.

The Nepalis are traditional Hindus, and have carefully avoided associating or integrating with the Buddhists. Religious differences, in fact, have been a source of social tensions. Usually, the Nepalis have chosen not to become citizens of Bhutan, and have segregated themselves from others. They have been and still are treated as second-class citizens, living in poverty, ignorance, and subservient roles.

There are three major sub-groups of Nepalis: the Rai, the Gurung, and the Limba. Most speak Nepali dialects, and maintain their own cultural patterns.

The kingdom of Bhutan was closed to Christian missionaries until 1965. The Nepalis have been more responsive to Christianity than any of the other groups. The number of Nepalis who have become Christians has grown since 1970 thanks to the work of Nepali pastors. Nevertheless, the number of Christians is only 1%.

# AFGHANISTAN: NURISTANIS

Afghanistan, the mountainous country, surrounded by the Soviet Union on the north, surrounded by the Soviet Union on the north, surrounded by the Soviet Union on the west, has long Pakistan on the east and south, and Iran on the west, has long been closed to Christian missionaries. The Soviet invasion has only served to make Christian witness even more difficult. The 20,000,000 people of Afghanistan are Muslims.

Nuristan, which means "Land of Light", is in the northeastern part of Afghanistan bordering Pakistan. Although Islam swept into Afghanistan as early as 652 AD, the Nuristanis resisted conversion for almost 12½ centuries, finally succumbing to a massive invasion in 1895-96. However, a few thousand of these "Kafir" (infidels) fled across the border to the Chitral valleys of Pakistan, where they are now known as the "Kalash Kafirs".

In his book *Nuristan: "The Land of Light" Seen Darkly,* Louis Dupree sums up the Nuristani religion as follows:

"Nuristan, so recently converted to Islam (1895-96) offers three religious faces: (1) the new fanaticism of the convert; (2) old Kafir customs now considered Islamic; (3) pride of the Kafir warrior past, though now dimly remembered by the elderly and passed on in impure form to the youth."

The clothing, culture, and lifestyle of the Nuristani differ quite markedly from the Afghan. Muslim leaders have even sent in mullahs (trained in law and doctrine) to live among them to conform them to Islamic ways. They have even created a myth that the Nuristanis are a lost Qureish tribe (Muhammad's own tribe) to ease the rejection of their ancestral religion.

Pray that the way may open in Afghanistan for the Good News of salvation through Jesus Christ to be spread there. Pray too that a witness may be sent to the Nuristanis in Pakistan, and that they may become a channel for reaching their Muslim relatives—numbering about 70-80,000— in Afghanistan.

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of China): Despite its universal education program, the PRC faces massive problems in bringing the population up to the standard elementary educational level. Only 60% of Chinese youths finish primary school, and an estimated 120 to 140 million people are illiterate (about 15% of the population). Phay for ways to reach these illiterates and semi-illiterates. Pray especially for the expansion of Christian radio broadcasting, such as the Far East Broadcasting Co.

--JAPAN: An active ministry of harbor evangelism to the many ships from China is underway in Japan's harbors. New Testaments and other Bible portions as well as Gospel literature are being given to the crews of the ships from China. Pray for fruitful results of this ministry to the seamen of the PRC.

--MAINLAND CHINA--Yunnan Province: Among the minority peoples in this southern province are the Dai people, with over 500,000 population. They are Buddhists. They are farmers, and are concentrated in the borderland district at the extreme southern part of the province. Pray that the Dai people may hear the Good News of salvation through Jesus Christ.


--SOUTHEAST ASIA--Refugees: The January count of Indochinese refugees in U.N. camps throughout Southeast Asia was nearly 170,000. They wait hopefully for an opportunity to move out of the camps into permanent homes in other countries. Pray for these people as they wait, that both their physical and their spiritual needs may be met, and especially that they may come to know Jesus Christ as their lord and Saviour.
