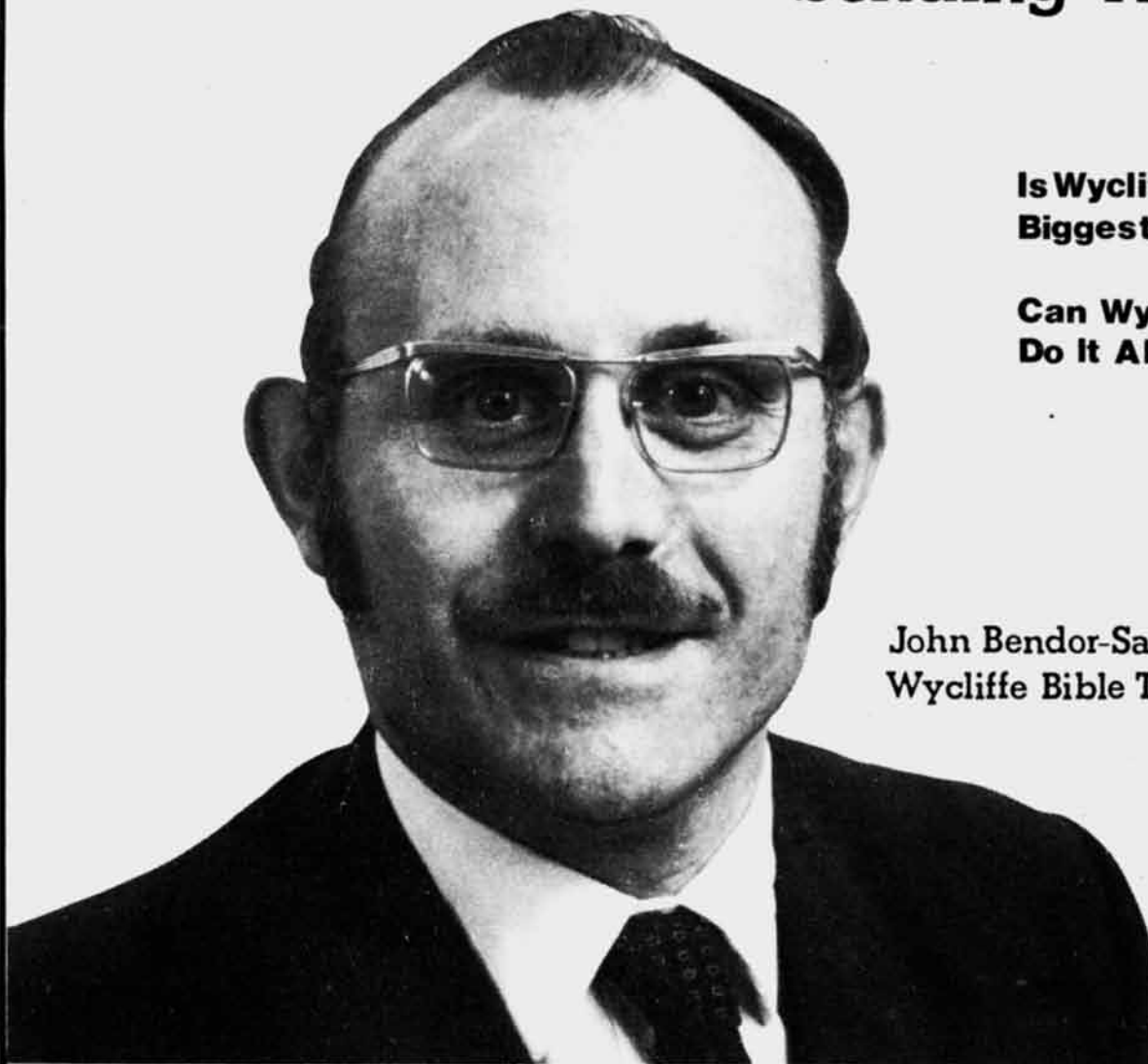

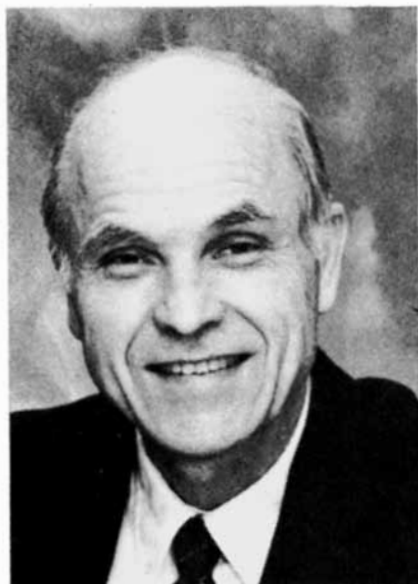

Dear faithful friends,

On the dinner table here beside me as I type these words is a letter of staggering importance from Dallas, Texas.

I heard about it (and the momentous decision behind it) a few days ago. But the actual letter has been in my hands for only a few minutes now.

God has done stunning things, surprising things for us before--true miracles of His blessing--which we cannot now forget. But just as our load has been getting sharply bigger and heavier, so also help is apparently coming to us in bigger packages, too.

Thus it turns out that a wonderful group of missionaries, who together are in some respects the world's largest mission agency, has heard our cries for help and has decided to do something about it.

What details we are able to mention at this early stage are mentioned on pages 4 & 5. We had a cover story about the founder of the mission when he died in April 1982. But now surely is the time to give some of the amazing highlights about this truly great and now helping organization. See the cover story for that.

But now, our task--quite frightening if our faith fails us--is to try to figure out how this new help can begin to be of sufficient force in time for our March \$300,000 payment. That will require 20,000 new \$15 donors. (That's almost twice as many new people as we first came to know during the period surrounding the crisis last September!)

Meanwhile, our faithful workers on our embarrassingly small "Touch Ten" team have come up with another plan which will also help to get the good news out across America--that the world is truly reachable, that God's people all around the world are the strongest force on earth....see their story too (p.11).

HIDDEN PEOPLES??

In this publication, you will often come across the phrases "frontier missions," and "Hidden Peoples." Just for the record, let's review what they mean.

The term "Frontier Missions" has been officially defined and is now used by missiologists to describe cross-cultural outreach to people groups in which there is not presently a viable, indigenous, evangelizing church.

Note that this definition is similar to that of an unreached people group. Over 2.5 billion people live in 16,750 of these "hidden" people groups—hidden from our view and the conventional outreach of existing churches and mission agencies. "Frontier" missions is thus a critical complement to "regular" missions if new beachheads for the gospel are to be established within still untouched cultural groups.

The Hidden Peoples are found mainly among the Muslim, Chinese, Hindu, Buddhist and tribal peoples of the world. These thousands of bypassed people groups, whether in cities or in jungles, are the final Frontiers of the gospel.

Less than 10 per cent of the world's missionaries and only 5 per cent of mission money are focused on these 16,750 groups.

Campus Financial Update

"THEY SAVED OTHERS— THEMSELVES THEY CANNOT SAVE?"

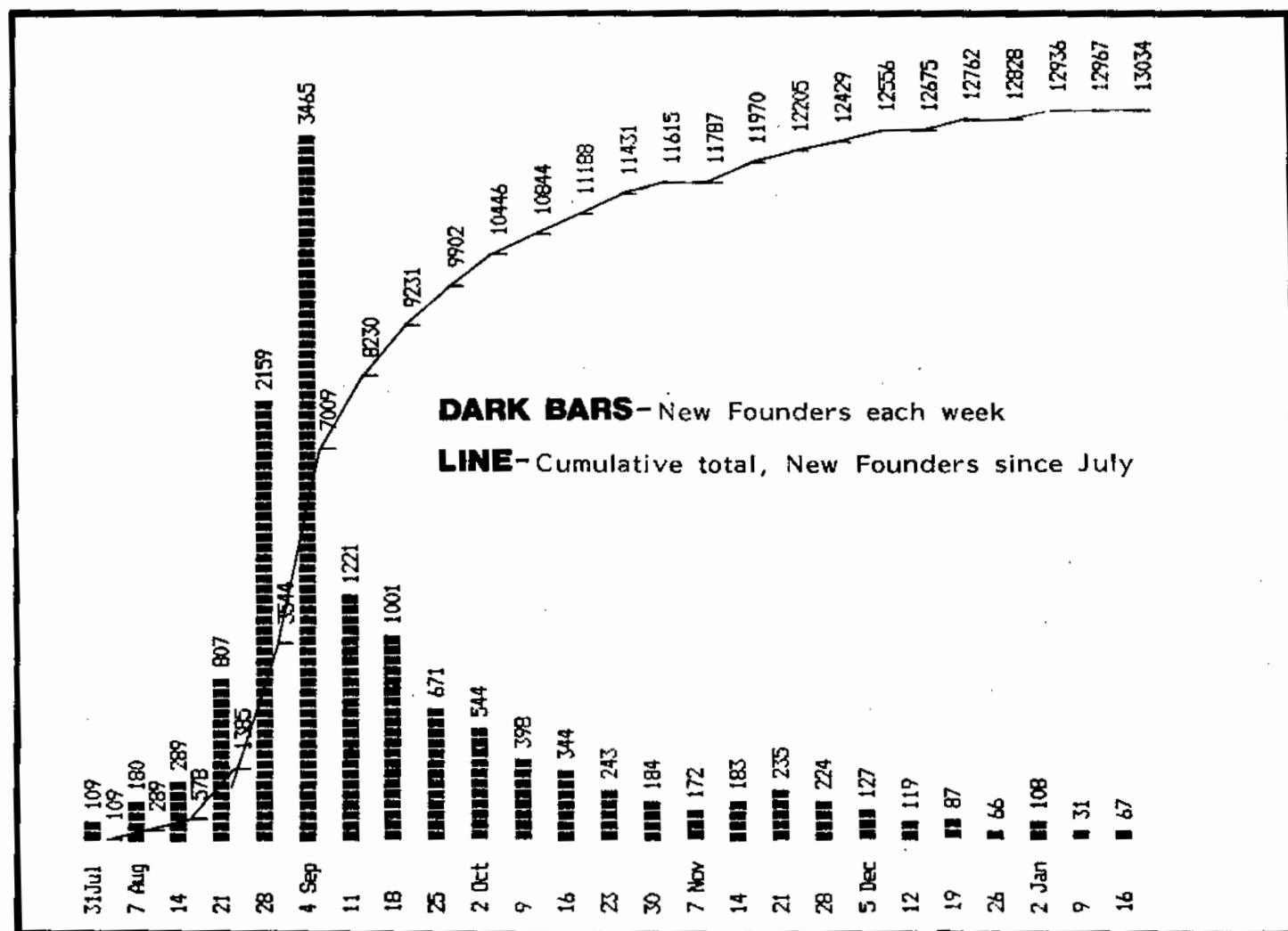
We are busy trying to save others. We are proud of that. As the world's largest cooperative mission center, with people from over 60 mission agencies working here every day, only 5 people are spared to work on the Touch Ten plan, which is our exclusive means of raising money to pay for our property. We are here to save the cause of missions, not just ourselves.

Are we saving others? I'll skip over all the non-financial contributions we are making. For example, during this month alone 660 students in 14 centers across the country are studying our block-buster basic college credit course on missions. Twenty thousand have studied

our thick text in the last three years. They will become the backbone of mission supporters in their churches. Many will go overseas. Through them we are helping churches and mission agencies. Not us!

In terms of money alone, we are already raising \$3.2 million per year for others through the Frontier Fellowship, which is mainly an educational and inspirational activity which we started. Soon we hope that will grow to \$100 million per year, given through this movement to many, many other groups. Not to us!

Right here more than \$5 million per year is generated for the agencies participating with us on this campus. But not for us!



Indirectly, our posters, our facts and figures, our research in dozens of striking new avenues, is flowing into the veins of the U.S. and world evangelical movement, inevitably assisting in the raising of other millions. Not for us!

WHY NOT FOR US?

Precisely because we encourage other organizations to consider this Center a place to work together on the final mission frontiers, our conviction of God's will for us (ever since 1977) has been to avoid competition for funds. That has led us to THE WORLD'S HARDEST WAY TO RAISE MONEY--namely, to ask for a small one-time donation from a large number of people.

THE BEST NEWS YET

God has remembered us in our need. So have the mission agencies. Wycliffe Bible Translators, in some ways the biggest mission going today, has decided to help us.

How? Wycliffe leaders have offered to ask their 5,048 missionaries each to become \$15.95 Founders. They are also willing to urge their 500,000-1,000,000 supporters to do the same.

Isn't this amazing? Isn't this truly magnanimous? Surely it is!

But is it God's best plan? If we are truly serious about the necessity of broadening the base of missions for all agencies, perhaps God would rather we encouraged Wycliffe supporters and staff to each send "invitations to hope" further out to people who may not now regularly give to the mission cause.

That way they will help add new supporters to the cause, not just get more money for us from existing supporters. And these new founders of the Center can in turn become potential continuing donors for Wycliffe. But not for us!

We know that this is a harder way to go. And our crisis is as great as ever, perhaps even more so. But we think that this plan is better in the long run because the cause of the frontiers will become known to many, many more people.

SYNOPSIS OF PREV. INSTALLMENTS:

1. Last Sept. the \$6 million final balloon payment came due on two thirds of the campus.

2. But our TOUCH TEN campaign had already opened up an ocean of good will, and produced the beautiful picture you see across the page--of 13,034 new people responding for the first time to the challenge of the world's Hidden Peoples!

3. How it worked: we sent out one first-class letter as a cry for help. Almost immediately 402 stalwart people in local congregations accepted entire "HOPE Chests" (with 100 packets in them, each packet containing 10 invitations.)

4. Roughly half of those packets were placed in the hands of a small army of (about 6,500) willing workers who in turn agreed to try prayerfully to "Touch Ten" people further out--beyond their own congregations.

5. We estimate that eventually 53,000 invitations were sent out by this method. As of Jan 16 exactly 13,034 (about 24%) had come in. In terms of the suggested \$15 gifts, these gave \$200,000. Many gave more, especially former donors, so that a total of almost \$1 million came in.

6. But that didn't total \$6 million. Thus we were unable to make the balloon payment and had to accept a 2 year escape clause that imposes both higher payments and higher interest (still under discussion).

7. With what the Lord did give us we were at least able to pay what was overdue from June. We also paid the new legal minimum of \$300,000 for Sept 1st. And we have since paid the next \$300,000 due Dec 1st. Now, noon on Jan. 16, we have \$236,899 toward our March 1st payment.

8. However, looking at the picture to the left, you can see that additional \$15.95 donors are now only trickling in. (Same with other gifts.) To make the March 1st payment we may have to dig into reserves intended for other purposes. Even that will not be sufficient for the June '84 payment.

9. So, the question is, "How can we get moving again?"

COVER: Let us be praying for John Bendor-Samuel, the new Executive Vice-President of this major organization, as it looks forward into astounding opportunities and formidable obstacles. David Cumming, an Australian, is President. John, an Englishman, has been a key Wycliffe executive in Africa as well as being in charge of the Summer Institute of Linguistics in England for the past 25 years. The international flavor has never been so prominent!

ITEM: Wycliffe is so big that five moving vans are criss-crossing the U.S. constantly just to pick up the belongings of their new people going to the field.

ITEM: Wycliffe sends out more U.S. citizens (3,555) into the foreign mission field than all of the 36 member denominations of the

National Council of Churches put together. Plus another 1,493 who join Wycliffe from other countries (such as 425 Canadians).

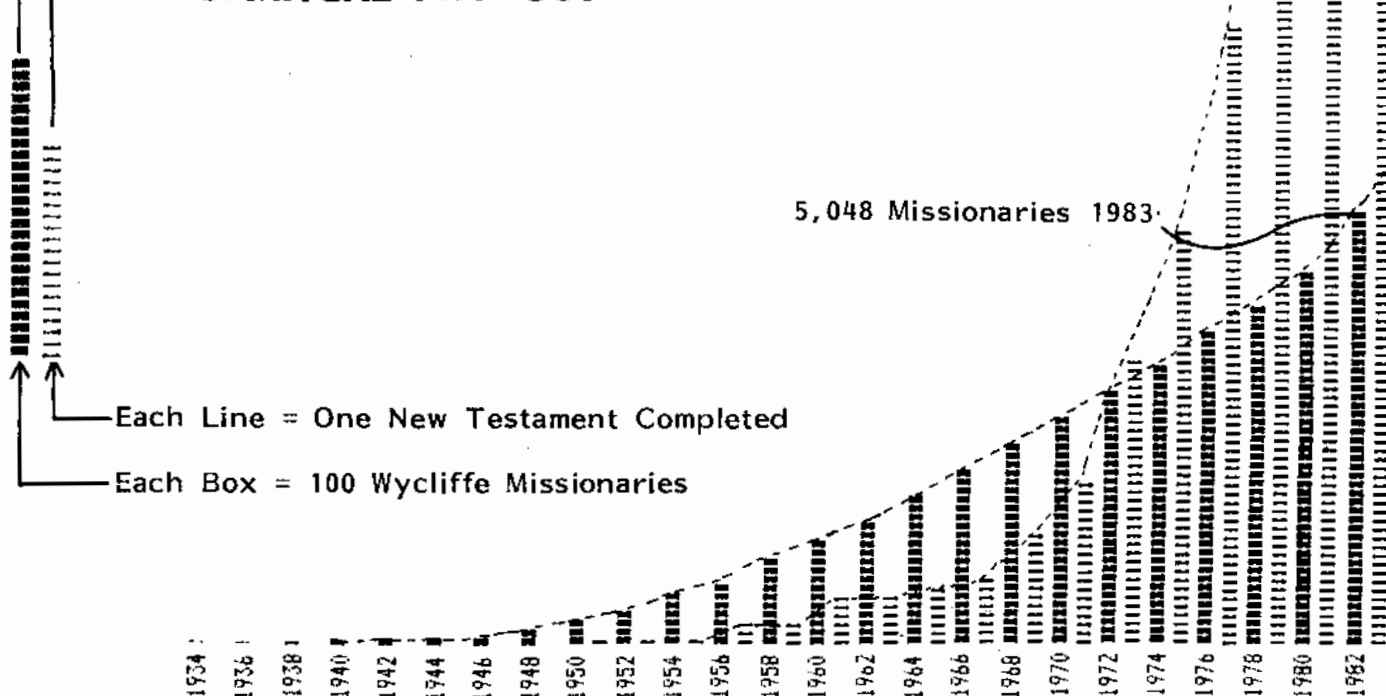
However, let's not get started off on that kind of a tangent. On what precise basis, really, could we ever say that one mission agency is bigger than all others? For example, candidates for bigness might boast of many things.

--Gospel Recordings has dealt with more languages (about 4,000).

--World Vision and the Southern Baptist Foreign Board both handle more money, and the latter has about as many North American personnel (3,363).

--Campus Crusade has by one definition 15,000 workers and touches more people through its Jesus film. (All standard missions have developed formally

trained national leaders. Altogether they number well over 500,000.)

--Youth With a Mission actually processes more new people per year, perhaps 3,000 (in short term missions).

WHAT THEN IS UNIQUE ABOUT WYCLIFFE?

A. WYCLIFFE took in more than 325 new career missionaries last year! (That, in one year, is more than the total number serving in most missions.)

B. WYCLIFFE now draws its missionary candidates from 29 countries (and sends them to 40).

C. WYCLIFFE has begun work with 907 tribal groups and is working right now with 695!

D. WYCLIFFE has 130 Ph.D.s, with another 60 in process. Plus 700 M.A.s and the world's largest network of linguistic institutes of the highest calibre--open to all missions.

E. MUCH MORE IMPORTANT: Wycliffe has zeroed in on the world's tribal peoples, surely some of the most needy, threatened people on the face of the earth. Why is that important?

****Tribal people are more numerous than the population of the U.S.--over 200 million.**

****They come in 5,000 shapes and sizes, requiring distinct approaches.**

****They speak at least 3,000 languages sufficiently different to require different printed materials to read.**

****Thus, tribal peoples amount to greater diversity than all the rest of missionary work in all the world!**

****Tribal peoples represent the most politically delicate of all mission fields. They are virtually imprisoned in their own countries in most cases. National governments, run by**

majority peoples, at best are embarrassed or indifferent and at worst are even hostile to them. (How can outsiders get past those officials who do not want anyone drawing attention to their tribal peoples? It is a wonder missions have been able to do it at all!)

WHAT IS WYCLIFFE'S SECRET?

The deep human drama behind the astounding picture across the page can only be told in the amazing story of "Uncle Cam" who was the principal founder. (See the special half-price book offer on the back cover).

But the FIFTY years you see on the left tell us two things that are very profound:

1. Tackling jungles and building a solid team and measuring your output by whole New Testaments in previously unwritten languages is not a recipe for instant success. Note that after Wycliffe got started it was 17 years before a single NT was completed, and 30 before 7 were done. But then--"whoosh!"

2. The "Spiritual Product" has GROWN FASTER than the missionary force! We'll see more in a moment why that blessed event has taken place. But now we are left hanging in the balance as to what can become of this huge, fantastic missionary team--from 29 nations to 40 nations (and to 907 HIDDEN PEOPLES).

Can Wycliffe do it alone?

WYCLIFFE (give them credit) has never tried to do it alone.

In fact, Cam Townsend's greatest strategic error was to assume that all the existing boards would immediately rally to the tribal world...to which he now became a modern day apostle with all the scuffs and bruises and hardships that involves.

Other missions, both interdenominational and denominational agencies, were doing some substantial tribal work in some places. But it would have been hopeless futility to expect them all instantly to grasp Townsend's vision. Vision grows slowly.

To this writer, however, the best question is not "can" Wycliffe do it alone.

To be sure, the teeter totter above would seem to imply a crushing, impossible load, but the projections across the page show that it is not unthinkable in terms of past growth rates.

Wycliffe does not WANT to do it alone! Even though Townsend somewhat failed to attract existing missions to plunge into tribal work, Wycliffe has never ceased to believe that other missions could and would and should help!

I was one of hundreds, perhaps thousands over the years, trained in linguistics and tribal techniques--and later worked with a tribe--although I was never a member of Wycliffe itself.

Wycliffe has encouraged Lutherans to form the Lutheran Bible Translators. Never suppose the Lutherans decided to "compete" with Wycliffe. Wycliffe will collaborate with any mission--denominational or other--if it is known that that group would like to share the tribal challenge.

Some missions already specialize in tribal work just like Wycliffe does. I think of Regions Beyond Missionary Union and New Tribes Mission, Unevangelized Fields Mission, etc.

Others, as the future unfolds, may seek to work creatively with Wycliffe, leaning on their expertise and considerable experience.

A Church for Every People, by the Year 2000? (Tribe)

WHAT WILL HAPPEN BY THE YEAR 2,000?

Can Bible translation catch on in wider circles?

A single major event may symbolize for us the new forces that are on the horizon for tribal work. The World Consultation on Frontier Missions at Edinburgh in 1980 was strongly supported by Wycliffe. George Cowan, one of Wycliffe's early "anchor men" gave the plenary presentation on unfinished work in the tribal sphere. The Sudan Interior Mission, now working worldwide as SIM International, was strongly represented by Gerald Swank, their specialist in new tribal fields.

The Africa Inland Mission sent no less than Richard Anderson, now International

Secretary, plus the entire top (African) staff of the Africa Inland Church Mission Board! In light of their 1979 commitment to "100 New Hidden Peoples by 1990," the Foursquare Church sent a District Superintendent. The Missouri Synod sent their top mission exec, Southern Baptists sent two, etc.

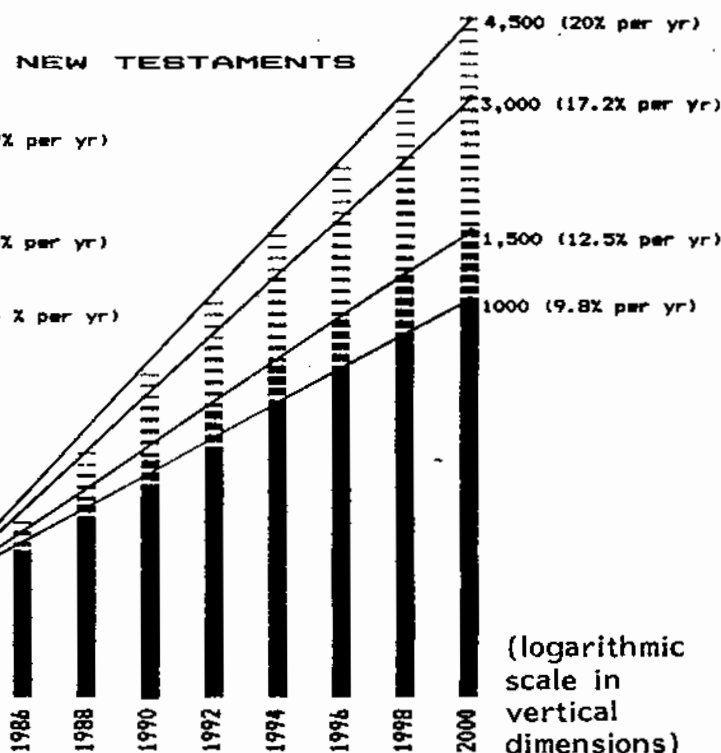
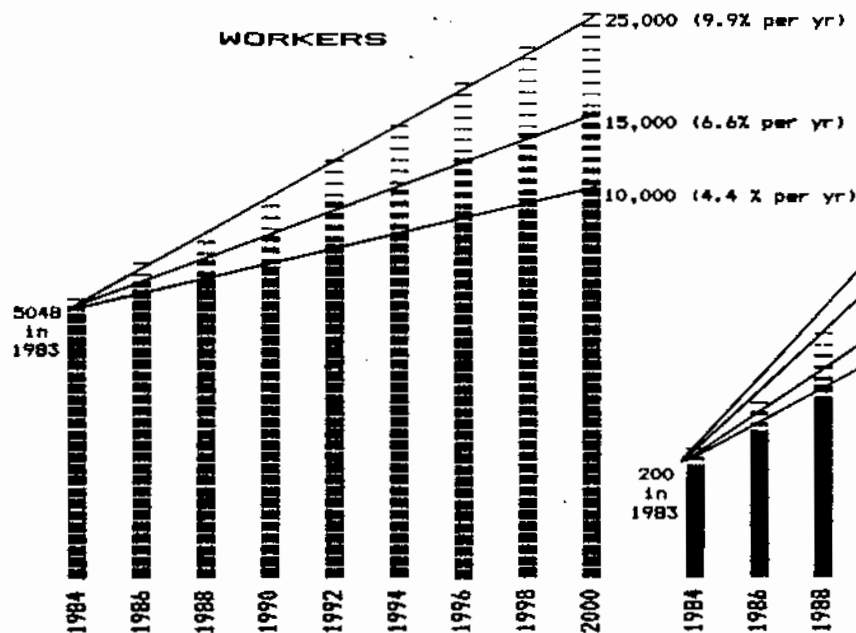

Even more important: not only more mission agencies sent delegates to Edinburgh than to any previous world-level meeting in history, but fully one-third of the delegates were from non-Western missions (like the AIM Africans mentioned above).

Panya Baba, for example, gave a plenary address. He is the head of the SIM-related, Nigerian-staffed Evangelical Missionary Society, which sends out 440 Africans, mostly in cross-cultural work even outside Nigeria. Similarly, in Ghana as a result of Wycliffe's school for translators started there in 1971, 46 Ghanaian members of Wycliffe now work with 29 different languages!

Thus two things are happening: 1) tribal work is becoming more prominent as a major frontier along with Muslims, Chinese, Hindus, and Buddhists, and 2) we can count on more and more nationalities to help out, whether formally or informally related to Wycliffe itself.

Wycliffe and the U.S. Center

From the very founding of the Center for World Mission here in Pasadena, many mission agencies have shown great interest in its potentialities and have offered help. Wycliffe has lent help in several ways.

The letter to the right shows recent evidence of appreciation for the way in which these two organizations are closely related.

Still more recently, Wycliffe has decided to try to enlist its own missionary members, and in turn its 500,000-1,000,000 supporters, to help pay off this property. We feel this is a very, very significant step for which we are profoundly grateful.

One reason Wycliffe leaders decided to do this is explained in the letter to the right—they feel we are helping them in their cause. But another reason is the fact that we present no long-term fund-raising threat to their support base. Although they have never before urged their people to give funds to another mission, the USCWM presents a different case. Why? Because we have been unswerving in our policy not to cultivate long-term giving to our own operational costs. (We are, and always have been, operationally self-sustaining.)

We look upon Wycliffe as a strong, experienced agency. If

Wycliffe's collaboration in our "Touch Ten" campaign reaches the outer limits of their support base, we may soon find ourselves over our financial hump. Wycliffe also will benefit: the "Touch Ten" campaign could bring them 100,000 to 200,000 new supporters.

But this is only the beginning. The Touch Ten campaign can be taken up and copied by any group. Our basic purpose is to broaden the support base and the vision base of the entire mission movement. We believe God wants to help us do that.

Summer Institute of Linguistics and Wycliffe Bible Translators **General Statistics**

1. Languages currently spoken in the world: about 5,000.
2. Languages still needing Bible translation: possibly 3,000.
3. People represented by these languages: at least 200 million.
4. Languages with some or all of the Bible: 1,565 (236 complete Bibles, 500 NT only, 829 portions only). These figures do not include subdialects, extinct languages and languages with inadequate translations. From now on our statistics will reflect this method of calculating.
5. Languages in which Bible Translation and/or preparatory linguistic studies are currently in progress: 695 by SIL and WBT; 943 by SIL, WBT and others.
6. Languages in which SIL & WBT personnel have completed the N.T. or have had substantial involvement: 202.
7. Total number of language projects in which we have been involved: 907.
8. Countries represented by the languages in which we are working: over 40. This reflects cases of working with displaced peoples, etc.
9. Population of each Bibleless language group: this varies greatly, from as few as under 100 to more than 23 million.
10. Adult SIL and WBT workers in all categories: 5,048, 728 of these are STAs.
11. Countries of origin of our members: 29. About 30% of our members are from countries other than the U.S.
12. Time required to translate the N.T.: about 15 years, sometimes longer, sometimes shorter. In one case it was done in three years (in a group already missionized, with people well educated and prepared to be trained to translate). Translation progress has been greatly accelerated by more extensive training of our members, by on-the-field consultant programs and workshops, by more and better printed exegetical helps and by computer-assisted editing.
13. Additional translators and support personnel needed: many more. Current vacancies, 1,465 in all categories. It should be emphasized that the Bible translation job is not endless; the goal is attainable as Christians worldwide give proper priority to this responsibility.

Become a "Hope Here's Six"

We'd like to highlight some very special people--our "Hope Chest" coordinators. All 402 of these sterling folk have been busy as bees. The following six, however, were interviewed because they had more than 100 responses each from their "Hope Chests". This means that in each case more than 100 people came to a new knowledge of the remaining mission task--the "Hidden Peoples"--and became founders of this Center as a result of their efforts. So we asked these "Hope Chest" coordinators, "What's the secret?"

Lesson A: Get help in the distribution and follow-up of packets.

CASE #1: LEEBA CURLIN

Leeba Curlin is a busy lady! She's the mother of seven children and she and her equally busy husband, John (an obstetrician-gynecologist), are very active in their church, the Evangelical Community Church of Jackson, Tennessee. The way she approached her "Hope Chest" was to spend three to four days "flat out" on the phone. "It was hectic, but I was determined!" She emphasizes that the way to get people involved is to talk with them personally--one to one--sharing vision and the extent of their possible contribution. She also had 15 "faithful people with a genuine heart for missions" over to her house for an evening, when she presented the challenge of the Hidden Peoples and the ministry of the Center. Each guest took from one to four packets. Finally, Leeba says, it's important to have

your church behind you. Her pastor gave her 10 minutes in the morning service. "I know you all know 10 people", she said. "I'll be at the back door." Thirty-five responded. Were there any blessings for her and her "packet people"? "Definitely!" Numerous friends came and thanked her for giving them an opportunity to be involved. One said "I'm so happy to hear of something I can trust and give to." Thank you, Leeba!

CASE #2: BEN SHELTON

Pastor Ben Sheldon and his wife, Amy, were themselves missionaries in Korea from 1953 to 1964. He is now senior pastor of the Bethany Collegiate Presbyterian Church in Havertown, Pennsylvania. Why was their box response so high? Once again it appears to be the personal approach. Amy, aided by the church secretary, called the entire church membership (750), patiently explaining the purpose and need of the Center, and asking each to give an hour of his or her time to spread the vision. Seventy-five accepted the challenge. Follow-up phone calls were made to encourage implementation. A monumental task!

CASE #3: NADINE STARNER

Mrs. Nadine Starnier works part-time as the missions coordinator at her church--the Church of the Open Door in York, Pennsylvania. Their mission committee is very active, sponsoring both a spring missions conference and a fall seminar. Nadine is quick to

attribute her effectiveness in packet distribution to the help she received from the other 14 mission committee members. Each distributed and followed up on eight to ten packets. Many hands make light work! Nadine feels the project had definite benefits: the level of mission awareness was raised in the church through this exercise.

Lesson C: Work through, and with the blessings of, the local church.

CASE #4: DOROTHY & IAN STONE

For the Norths of Stone Mountain, Georgia, the "Hope Chest" was a family affair! In fact, they took two "Hope Chests"! Mom and Dad (Dorothy and Ian, along with daughters Annette and Christine, "put in three or four days solid," and the packets "just disappeared". Some went to Columbia Bible College where other family members are studying. Dorothy leads a Frontier Fellowship prayer group at the First Baptist Church in Atlanta; almost seventy packets went to those twenty-five committed people. Finally, Ian, a

CASE #5: ART & RUTH SHELLY
Art and Ruth Shelly were in the midst of moving when their "Hope Chest" arrived. What's more, they had expected only ten packets—one hundred invitations, not one hundred packets! Undaunted, these former missionaries to Venezuela mailed out packets to committed, reliable friends—both other missionaries with TEAM (the Evangelical Alliance Mission) and pastors in their denomination (the Bible Fellowship Church.) Although mailing out packets makes accountability more difficult (to say nothing of expensive!), the response of these good people was overwhelmingly enthusiastic.

CASE #6: CAROL YUKE
Carol Yuke is the librarian at William Carey International University, affiliated with the U.S. Center for World Mission. Her approach to packet distribution was to get help! A friend at the University of California in Davis took 50 of the packets. These then went to local churches touched by the students in the U.C. Davis Frontier Fellowship. Her aunt

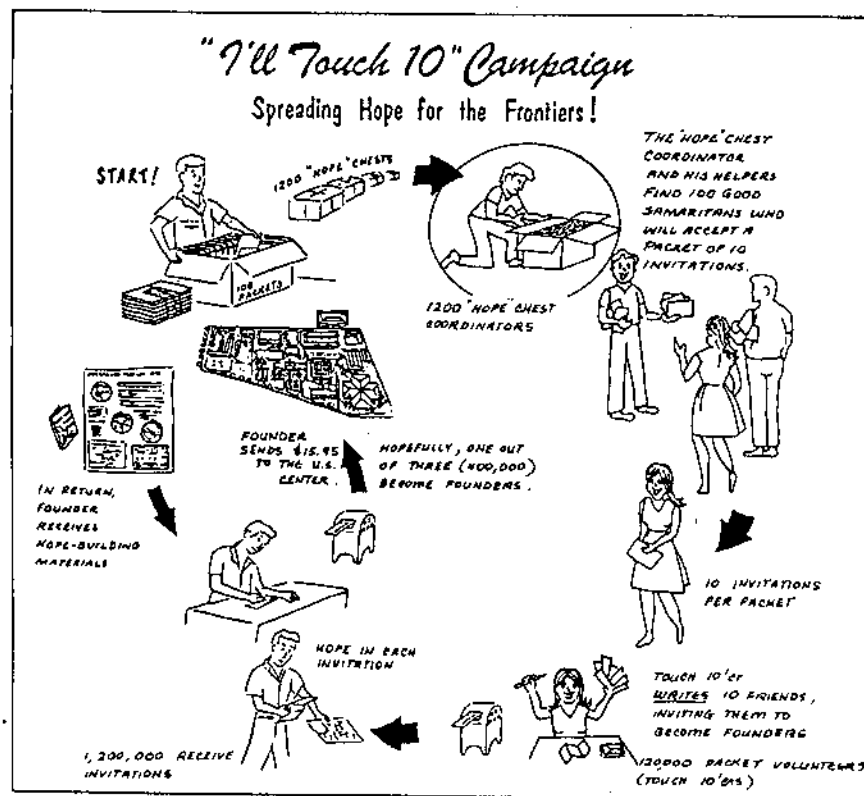
also took packets, which she gave out as individual invitations in her church. Her mother, Betty Yuke of San Francisco, announced in the morning service of the Berkeley Chinese Community Church that she would match every founding gift with \$15.00 of her own!

So what's the secret?
"Principles of success" that can be discerned from the above testimonies are: 1) **Getting help:** co-laborers to pray with and assist in both the distri-

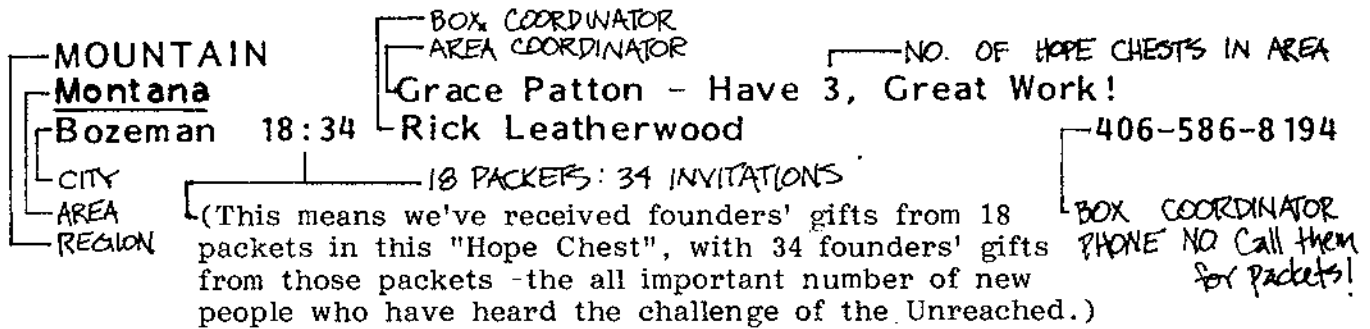
bution and follow-up of packets; 2) **Follow-up:** making sure people who took packets did indeed send out the invitations; 3) **Working through, and with the blessings of, the local church.**

We are humbled by the level of commitment and the sacrifices made by our "Hope Chest" coordinators and their helpers. We know that these labors have been "as unto the Lord". 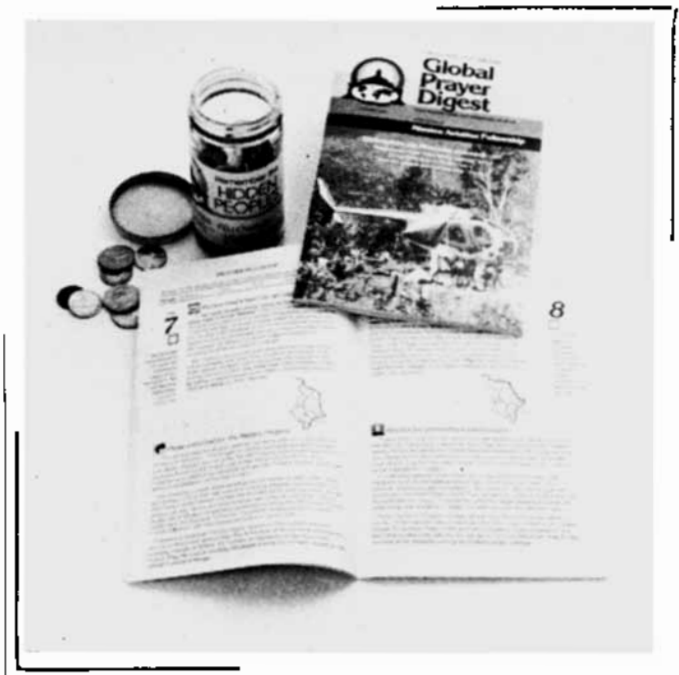

Frontier Fellowship in the Local Church



How can you explain "Hidden Peoples" and the Frontier Fellowship to young children in Sunday School? USCWM staffer Gerry Dueck here shares her experience:

"Hi, I'm Gerry Dueck, and I think you'll be glad that you're here today because now you're all members of a club! You all like clubs, don't you? The name of this club is a secret till just before you leave, when you will each get a label with the name of the club on it."

Using an exciting introduction with an air of anticipation, I usually get everyone's attention, whether they be 5 or 15 years old, in introducing the concept of the Hidden Peoples to children. If there are still a few who are not paying attention, a hidden child or hidden puppet who repeatedly calls out, "Help, I'm hidden!" usually quiets them. Instructing the children to use the "magic" words, "Jesus loves you," we get the hidden child "un-hidden."

I have other tools: my Bible, a globe with some cloth-covered areas, large posters depicting people (especially children) in unreached people groups, a container with small bags of rice, an empty loose change jar already labeled, hand puppets or flannel-graph figures of children from other cultures, slips of paper with Hidden People group names on them, and stick-on labels for each child with the words "Hidden Peoples Club" on them. Using these tools, I can keep children's attention from 15 to 40 minutes. By the end of the session, they can all tell me who Hidden Peoples are.

Using a variety of activities, simplified mission demographics games, and a song, I repeatedly refer to the term "Hidden Peoples." I also tell the Burma Plot story by re-enacting it with the rice I provide (in small closed plastic baggies!).

When asking the children what we could collect instead of rice, we get some amusing responses, such as potatoes or candy. But when I give the group their own loose change jar, already labeled, the children are very eager to drop in their coins. Those who bring coins are each given labels to take home with the instructions to involve their families in collecting loose change. As they leave, each child is given his or her stick-on label and each teacher is given a copy of the Frontier Fellowship Global Prayer Digest.

Teachers and superintendents are urged to do their own regular follow-up of missions education about once a month, and I try to give helpful ideas. I suggest they have the loose change jar available every Sunday. I have prepared a report, with more suggestions and resources for help, that you may obtain by checking the box on page 23 of Mission Frontiers.

Child participation and visual aids are the two keys to not only keeping the children's attention, but leading them to an understanding of who the Hidden Peoples are.

Global Prayer Digest to be Used in 3000 New Homes!

The Global Prayer Digest will be in the home of every member of First Evangelical Free Church (Fullerton, California) in February, says Assistant Pastor for Missions Bruce K. Camp.

This large church, pastored by Dr. Charles Swindoll, has long been known in southern California for its pragmatic approach to Christian living. Pastor Camp and the Missions Board have carried over this goal-oriented tradition to missions. Part of their approach will be the

distribution of some 3300 copies of the Global Prayer Digest (formerly Daily Prayer Guide) on February 5.

Pastor Camp believes that his responsibility is to educate the congregation in missions, and to encourage them to pray for world missions. As one approach to this task, every effort will be made to place a copy of the Global Prayer Digest in every home in the church the first Sunday in February. Throughout the month, its contents will find their way into pastoral

prayers, and veteran users of the "prayer guide" will share some techniques of application.

Some in the congregation have already been exposed to the Global Prayer Digest. Members of the "Potential Missionary Fellowship," a group which meets regularly for education and mutual support, have been encouraged to use the Daily Prayer Guide for the last year, as have the Missions Board and church staff.

Six-year-old Steve and the Global Prayer Digest



When Bob and Judy Waymire and their six-year-old son, Stevie, recently moved to Pasadena, California, one of the first things they did was to hang a relief map of the world on their living room wall. Why? As an aid to intercession for the peoples of the world!

Each morning after breakfast, Bob, Judy and Stevie gather in the living room to read that day's page in the Frontier Fellowship Global Prayer Digest, as well as to read the suggested Bible passage in the Living Bible. Although the Global Prayer Digest contains map sections in the margins of

its pages in order to help readers locate countries and peoples mentioned in the text, Bob and Judy want Stevie to be able to identify these same locations in a global context.

Therefore, as Bob or Judy begin each day's reading, Stevie sits before the relief map, pencil poised in one hand and ready to pinpoint the country, region or territory highlighted that day.

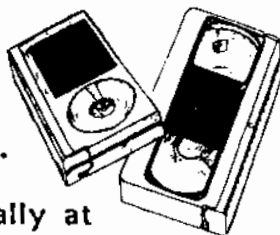
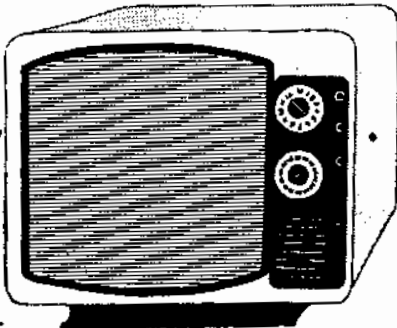
